OUR PAST

30 April - 2 May 1968 - Marine BLT 2/4 engaged and defeated elements of two enemy regiments from the 320th NVA Division in the small hamlet of Dai Do in the 3d Marine Division Cua Viet sector near Dong Ha. Both the Marine battalion and the enemy sustained heavy casualties in the intensive three-day battle. Two of the Marine company commanders were awarded the Medal of Honor for their actions during the battle.

Significance: The battle of Dai Do forestall a larger NVA offensive aimed at taking the large Marine headquarters and logistic base at Dong Ha. This was part of the renewed Communist offensive labeled "Mini-Tet" that occurred throughout much of South Vietnam at this time.


- **6 May 2008** Marines of Task Force National Capital Region began returning home to Marine Corps Base Quantico, Virginia, after spending six months deployed to Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. The specially created task force handled security details while in Iraq but was predominately made up of Marines not normally assigned infantry duties.
- **19 May 5 June 1998** Approximately 10,600 U.S. and 6,250 Thailand service members participated in Exercise Cobra Gold 98, the largest exercise in the Asian-Pacific region so far in 1998. The exercise was conducted against a real-world backdrop of regional uncertainty. Neighboring India and Pakistan conducted
- 11 nuclear weapons test blasts and Indonesia's President Mohammed Suharto was forced to resign from his 33-year reign as president. As Thai and U.S. troops trained together, 2,000 combat-ready Marines with the 31st Marine Expeditionary Unit were diverted from the exercise toward Indonesia and positioned offshore as a possible evacuation force in case foreign nationals were unable to safely leave the troubled country by commercial transportation.
- 23 May 1988 The V-22 Osprey, the world's first production tilt-rotor aircraft, made its debut during rollout ceremonies at Bell Helicopter Textron's Arlington, Texas, facility. More than 1,000 representatives from the industry, military, and media gathered at Bell's Flight Research Center to hear guest of honor Mr. Jim Wright, Speaker of the House of Representatives, and General Alfred M. Gray, Commandant of the Marine Corps, praise the versatile rotorcraft designed from the ground up to meet the needs of all four services on 21st century battlefields. The Osprey is scheduled for delivery to the Corps beginning in late 1991.
- **30 May 1918** 2d Division begins moving up to check the Germans. The 9th Infantry and the 5th Marines, the lead elements, are initially spread across the entire rear of the retiring XXI French Corps. As the 6th Marines and the 23d Infantry arrive they are fed into position and the thinly-held line becomes 11 miles long. The orders are: "No retirement will be thought of on any pretext whatsoever." By 4 June, most French units have withdrawn through the

lines and the Marines and soldiers are holding the front. Their frontage has been shortened to 9,000 yards by fresh French units, which fell in on their flanks. While the French were retiring through the Marines' lines, Captain Lloyd W. Williams, USMC, who was killed in the subsequent battle, snorted, "Retreat Hell, we just got there!" His famous comment was directed at a French officer who urged the Marines to retreat. When the Germans approached the Marines' lines, Marine rifle fire began killing them at 800 yards. German officers, who did not teach their men to shoot at individual targets, first thought they had encountered a panicky unit. But as their casualties mounted, they became convinced they were facing a unit armed with nothing but machine guns. Their advance stalled and never regained its momentum. Their drive on Paris was stopped.

DETAILS

CITATION

- For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty while serving as a rifleman with the 3d Battalion, 1st Marines, 1st Marine Division, in action against enemy Japanese forces on Okinawa Shima in the Ryukyu Chain, 2 May 1945. Dug in with another Marine on the point of the perimeter defense after waging a furious assault against a strongly fortified Japanese position, Pfc. Foster and his comrade engaged in a fierce hand-grenade duel with infiltrating enemy soldiers. Suddenly an enemy grenade landed beyond reach of the foxhole. Instantly diving on the deadly missile, Pfc. Foster absorbed the exploding charge in his own body, thereby protecting the other Marine from serious injury. Although mortally wounded, as a result of his heroic action, he quickly rallied, handed his own two remaining grenades to his comrade and said, "Make them count." Stouthearted and indomitable, he had unhesitatingly relinquished his own chance of survival that his fellow Marine might carry on the relentless fight against a fanatic enemy, and his dauntless determination, cool decision, and valiant spirit of self-sacrifice in the face of certain death reflect the highest credit upon Pfc. Foster and upon the U.S. Naval Service. He gallantly gave his life in the service of his country.

EAGLE SCOUT

On Saturday, April 29th, an Eagle Scout Ceremony was held for Eagle Scout Ryan Klimp from Boy Scout Troop 33 of Oakland Presbyterian Church of Clayton.

Ryan the son of Scott and Gina Klimp. He officially joined Cub Scouts at age 6 as a member of Pack 64, chartered at Mount Zion United Methodist Church, after 2 years of being an "honorary Scout" in his brother Noah's den. Ryan completed his Webelos and Arrow of Light with Pack 57 in 2016, and crossed over to Troop 33, here at Oakland Presbyterian Church. DID YOU KNOW THEY ARE MARINES?

DON ADAMS

The man known as Maxwell Smart, and the voice of Inspector Gadget, also served in the Marines during World War II. An actor-comedian recognized for his timing and delivery, served in the **Battle of Guadalcanal** and the Pacific Theater of Operations. During his wartime service, he was shot by a sniper and contracted blackwater fever, aka malaria. He recovered in a Navy hospital in New Zealand and then, once recovered, served as a Drill Instructor achieving the

rank of corporal before his discharge.



Upon returning to civilian life, Adams eventually broke into television in 1954 after years of struggling. He appeared on many comedy shows during the 1950s and early 1960s. He got his big break on Get Smart as the eponymous Maxwell Smart. The show lasted five seasons and Adams then went on to different points in his career. He struggled with type casting and eventually found further work in the *Inspector Gadget* animated series as Gadget himself. He continued acting and voicing projects until 2000.

DAN LAURIA

Lauria is best known for his role as the patriarch of the Arnold family, Jack, in *The Wonder Years*. He has





appeared in a couple more series which are still in recent memory such as *Sullivan and Son*, and *Pitch*. He grew up in New York, attended Southern Connecticut State University, where he began acting, and then served in the Corps as an officer. His service in the Corps was from 1970 to 1973 with him serving at An Loc which is close to the Cambodian border. Lauria left the service as a Captain.

His acting career has spanned over five decades including stage, film, and TV. He was in the film *Independence Day*, appeared on stage as <u>Vince Lombardi in Lombardi on Broadway</u> and served as the Department of Veteran Affairs celebrity hospital visitor for one year touring hospitals to meet patients. Significant TV credits for him include Law & Order: SVU, Walker, Texas Ranger, Batman Beyond, Smallville, JAG, Criminal Minds, NCIS: Los Angeles and Blue Bloods. He's made a career of playing America's Dad or coach. In the military, Lauria worked on the Kennedy assassination investigation.
